We spoke regularly, and every time we interacted I left feeling inspired, excited and fully supported by her guidance. The times spent in her home, having tea in her garden and sitting at her dining room table reviewing endless grant applications are moments I never took for granted – each conversation offering her unique perspective and the chance for us to catch up on life.



Barb never missed an opportunity to share stories of her family and how proud she was of each of them. The always present sparkle in her eye seemed to shine brighter when she would share stories of her adventures with Glenn, time at the cottage with family and friends or the many ways her daughters and grandchildren added to her life. These genuine emotions were just a small part of what made her such a role model to me. She was someone who put family first but also seemed to have endless time to care for everyone who crossed her path.
